Sixth-Graders Excel at Younger Campuses

Sixth-graders are more successful in an elementary school than they are in middle schools, according to a new study by researchers at Duke University and the University of California, Berkeley.

The bulk of the country's sixth-graders, including most in the Houston area, have been moved into middle schools over the last three decades. This new report shows that students are scoring lower on the standardized test and that the ill effects of grouping sixth-graders with older students last until at least these students reach the ninth grade.

"These findings cast serious doubt on the wisdom of the historic nationwide shift to the grades 6-8 middle school format," Philip Cook, Duke professor of public policy and economics and an author of the paper, said in a prepared statement. "As it turns out, moving sixth grade out of elementary schools appears to have had substantial costs."

101:
